# The Rite of Dedication

The custom of solemnly dedicating or consecrating buildings as churches or chapels set apart for Christian worship can be posited to the early centuries of Christianity itself. When we come to the earlier part of the 4th century, as Christianity emerges from the catacombs, allusions to and descriptions of the consecration of churches become plentiful.

The service of Dedication is found in Hebrew scripture and is commanded by God: the hallowing of the tabernacle and of its furniture and ornaments (Exodus 40); the dedication of Solomon's Temple (I Kings 8) and of the Second Temple by Zerubbabel (Ezra 6); its rededication by Judas Maccabaeus; the dedication of the temple of Herod the Great. In Christian scripture, Jesus' attendance at the Feast of Dedication (John 10:22–23) manifests the importance of its annual commemoration. The scriptural references point to the continuity of the early Christians deriving their custom of Dedication from the Jewish antecedents, and developing the same to fit the new Temples that would, eventually, grace every Christian community.

The hallowing of a Christian church as a public ceremony proclaims to a local community that there is a permanence, an investment, in spreading the Gospel. When the House of Worship is in the historic, Apostolic Tradition, the building becomes a 'Domus Dei' as the cleansing water of baptism initiates new Christians, the Sacraments are celebrated, and most importantly, the Mystical Banquet where Christ becomes our sustenance, making His dwelling amongst us in the Most Blessed Sacrament of the Altar, drawing the Faithful to His throne in the church.

In the Ritual used in the consecration of a building, the emphasis is on the removal of the structure from profane and secular use. Proper exorcistic prayers should form part of the ceremony, in driving from the place any invisible forces that would cause spiritual harm. Following this cleansing is the claiming of the building and all that forms its fabric for Christ, by the multiple dedications and signings with the Life-giving Cross and a permanent, prominent, Holy Table for sacrifice. Finally, the seal of Dedication is the solemn Holy Eucharist, the Great Thanksgiving, where Christ will feed His flock in this consecrated place for all time.

Following the tradition from the first centuries of the Church, and continued by the Churches of the East and West to this day, relics of the Saints have been included in the Dedication Rite for a Christian altar. This custom developed by catacomb Eucharistic celebrations taking place over the tombs of early martyrs of the Faith~ those who gave witness and life for Christ~ in imitation of the Lord Jesus' sacrifice on the Cross. Where this custom can be retained, it manifests a visible continuity with Historic Christianity, and union with the Church Triumphant. ~Canon Tutor

# The Rite of Dedication and The Consecration of the Altar

The Bishop and assistants assemble outside the church and form a procession. They process around the exterior of the church and precincts while the singing of the Veni Sancti Spiritus (**Hymnal 217**) is begun by the congregation. The exterior is asperged while the procession wends its way to the entrance.

The Bishop, with crosier in hand, knocks three times on the closed door of the church, and says:

Open to me the Gates of Holiness, and I will enter and give thanks unto the Lord.

R/ This is the gate of the Lord, the righteous shall enter it.

The doors are opened, and the Bishop then traces the Sign of the Cross with his crosier over the portal while saying:

+Peace be to this House, and to all who enter here; In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. **R/ Amen.** 

The procession proceeds, and the Bishop continues the aspersion of the interior of the church to the sanctuary. The Bishop halts before the altar gates and says:

The Lord be with you; **R/ And with thy spirit.** 

Lift up your hearts;

R/We lift them up to the Lord.

Let us give thanks unto our Lord God;

R/ It is meet and right so to do.

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty,...

R/ Amen.

Proceeding to the uncovered altar, the Bishop asperges the altar itself. Taking up the Sacred Chrism and anointing the sepulcher, he says:

Con+secrate and Sanc+tify this sepulcher. In the Name of the Father +, and of the Son +, and of the Holy Ghost +. Peace be unto this dwelling.

Then the relics are brought to the altar and placed within the sepulcher and are sealed.

The Bishop, then taking the Sacred Chrism, goes to the consecration crosses in the church and anoints each one. Having completed this, he proceeds to the altar and anoints the mensa while saying:

Sanc+tify and con+secrate this stone. In the Name of the Father+, and of the Son+, and of the Holy Ghost+, in honor of God, of the glorious Virgin Mary, and of All the Saints, and in the name and memory of St. John the Evangelist. Peace be with you.

A brazier is then placed in the midst of the altar and incense therein. Standing before the altar he says:

O send out thy light and thy truth, that they may lead me.

R/ And bring me unto thy holy hill and to thy dwelling.

That I may go unto the altar of God;

R/ Even unto the God of my joy and gladness.

Let us bless the Lord.

R/ It is meet and right so to do.

Thanksgiving and honor and glory be unto thee, Almighty God....

R/ Amen

Here is sung Hymn 126 'For All the Saints'

While the altar is cleaned and vested, the ornaments and lights are placed thereon and all lamps are kindled. After all the lights have been kindled, the Bishop, facing West toward the people, says:

I Dedicate this Altar and this Temple, together with all the Vessels and Vestments thereof, to the Glory of God and in honor of Saint John the Evangelist; In the Name of the +Father, and of the +Son, and of the +Holy Ghost.

R/ Amen

The Gloria in Excelsis is sung (Booklet Page 2) with the pealing of the church bells.

#### First Lesson

1 Maccabees 4: 52-59

Early in the morning on the twenty-fifth day of the ninth month, which is the month of Chislev, in the one hundred and forty-eighth year, they rose and offered sacrifice, as the law directs, on the new altar of burnt offering which they had built. At the very season and on the very day that the Gentiles had profaned it, it was dedicated with songs and harps and lutes and cymbals. All the people fell on their faces and worshiped and blessed Heaven, who had prospered them. So they celebrated the dedication of the altar for eight days, and offered burnt offerings with gladness; they offered a sacrifice of deliverance and praise. They decorated the front of the temple with golden crowns and small shields; they restored the gates and the chambers for the priests, and furnished them with doors. There was very great gladness among the people, and the reproach of the Gentiles was removed. Then Judas and his brothers and all the assembly of Israel determined that every year at that season the days of the dedication of the altar should be observed with gladness and joy for eight days, beginning with the twenty-fifth day of the month of Chislev.


#### **Announcements:**

- St. John the Evangelist ~ 1st Century Apostle and Evangelist
- St. John Baptist de La Salle ~ April 30, 1651- April 7, 1719 Founder of the Christian Brothers
- St. Frances of Rome ~ 1384 March 9, 1440 Advocate of the Poor and of Benedictine Oblates
- St. Catherine of Siena ~ March 25, 1347 April 29, 1380
   Reformer and Doctor of the Church
- St. Margaret Mary Alacoque ~ July 22, 1647 October 17, 1690
   Mystic of the Sacred Heart

## The Shrine of Holy Father St. Joseph


