Lighting of the Advent Wreath

The Greeting

The Lord will surely come.

And will not tarry, and will bring to light the hidden things of darkness, and will manifest himself to all nations. Alleluia.

The Lesson

During the reading of the Lesson the light (s) of the wreath are lit, one on Advent Sunday, two on the 2^{nd} Sunday in Advent, Three on the 3^{nd} Sunday in Advent, and four on the 4^{th} Sunday in Advent.

Here beginneth the 40th Chapter of the Book of Isaiah the Prophet.

Comfort, comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that her warfare* is ended, that her iniquity is pardoned, that she has received from the LORD's hand double for all her sins. A voice cries: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. And the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken."

First Lesson

Isaiah 35

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the LORD, the majesty of our God. Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. Say to those who are of a fearful heart, "Be strong, fear not! Behold, your God will come with vengeance, with the recompense of God. He will come and save you." Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then shall the lame man leap like a hart, and the tongue of the dumb sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes. And a highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not pass over it, and fools shall not err therein. No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there. And the ransomed of the LORD shall return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

The O Antiphons

In the Western tradition of the Church, one of the liturgical preparations in this near-season for Christmas are the 'O Antiphons,' seven titles from the Old Testament pointing to the coming Messiah. The origin of their compilation goes back to the dawn of the Middle Ages, with reference to them in the writings of the Roman counsel and philosopher Boethius (480-524 AD).

The seven antiphons, which begin on December 17th and end on December 23rd, Christmas Eve's Eve, are as follows:

In their Latin original:	In their somewhat variable English translations:
O Sapientia	O Wisdom
O Adonai	O Lord God
O Radix Iesse	O Root (or Rod) of Jesse
O Clavis David	O Key of David
O Oriens	O Rising Sun (or Morning Star)
O Rex Gentium	O King of the Nations (or Gentiles)
O Emmanuel	O Emmanuel

Each day, these antiphons comprise the basis for the antiphons at Vespers, the universal Evening Prayer of the Church. Readings also go along with each antiphon, taken from the Old Testament, making clear how each of these titles allegorically referred to the coming Messiah.

As a bonus aspect, the acronym formed by the first letter in the antiphons, when spelled backwards, is *ero cras*, Latin for "I will be (there) tomorrow." This is likely no coincidence, for the mediaeval theologians loved puns and plays upon words. The antiphons were probably deliberately framed this way to help us even further in our 'waiting upon' the Christ, who would free His people from their sins and offer the world redemption.

A very blessed last days of Advent to one and all, as we prepare for the birth of our Saviour and King.


